


Developing a Practice Tool(s) for Prescribing Cascades in Primary Care Teams

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INTRODUCTION

- Prescribing cascades are important contributors to medication-related harm.
- Analysis of interviews with people who may have experienced a cascade, their caregivers, physicians and pharmacists demonstrated that a practice guidance tool is needed to help clinicians prevent, identify, and address prescribing cascades.

OBJECTIVES

- To explore barriers and facilitators to addressing prescribing cascades as experienced by primary care clinicians.
- To gather the clinicians’ perspective about the important features of a practice guidance tool(s).

METHODS

- 5 focus groups (Mar 2022 - May 2022)

Intra-Professional

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Inter-Professional
- Participants: team-based, Ontario primary care clinicians
 - Pharmacists (RPhs)
 - Physicians (MDs)
 - Nurse practitioners (NPs)
- Theoretical Domains Framework & GUIDE-M Tool used to guide the discussion
- Planned analysis using codebook thematic analysis

RESULTS

- Analysis in progress, barriers/facilitators identified (right panel)
- Participants (n=16):
 - Intra-professional: RPh (n=5, 3) | MD (n=5) | NP (n=3)
 - Inter-professional: RPh (n=2) | MD (n=1) | NP (n=1)

CONCLUSION

- Study findings will inform content, design, and development approach for a practice guidance tool for primary care clinicians.

What is a prescribing cascade?

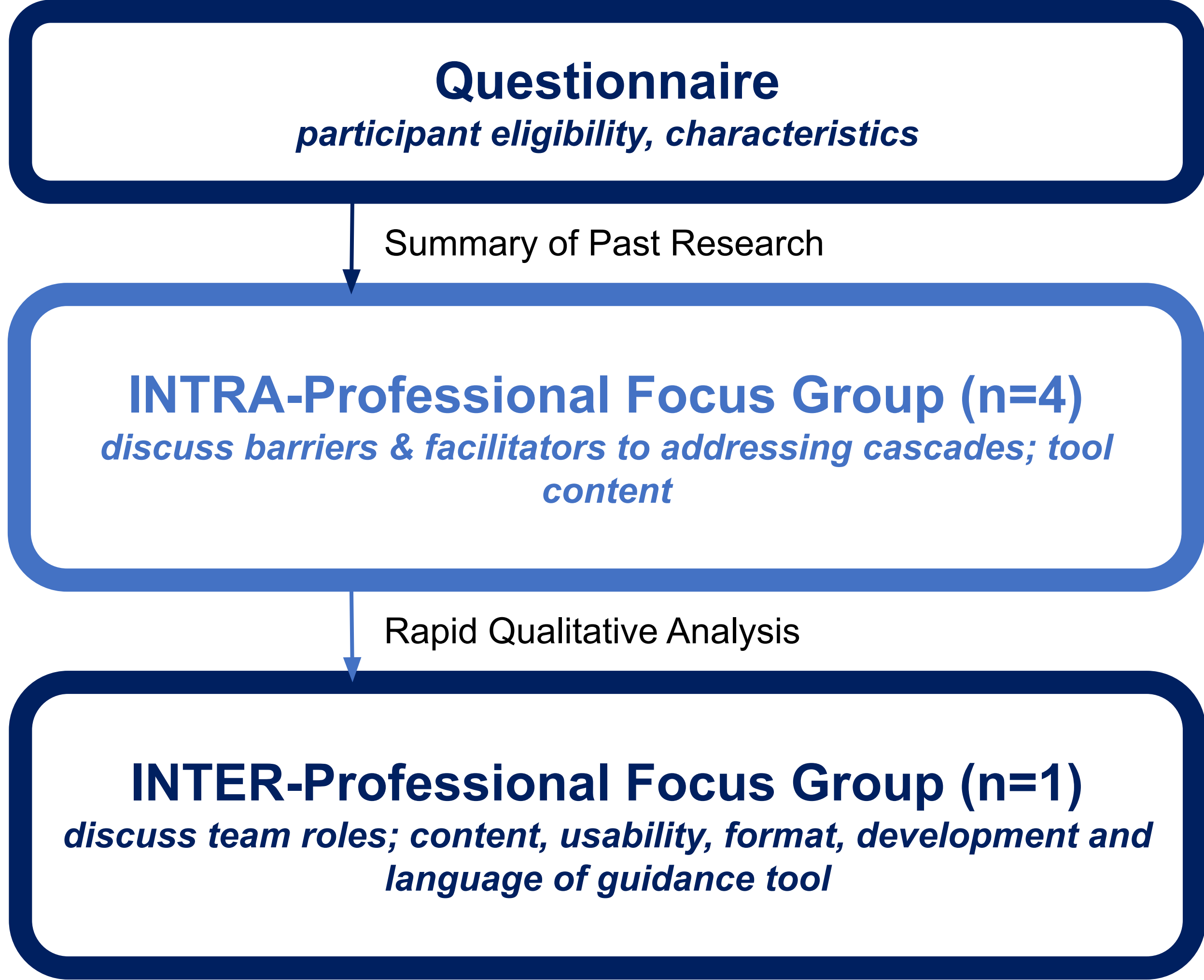


We gathered clinicians’ input on a practice guidance tool(s) for prescribing cascades.

WHAT IS A PRACTICE GUIDANCE TOOL

- A ‘practice guidance tool’ provides organized and systematically developed recommendations that help clinicians make decisions about how to best care for a patient.
